## **Discussion Questions**

- 1. How does linking empathy to maturity challenge or reshape your own understanding of what it means to be spiritually mature?
- 2. Hebrews 4:15 and Philippians 2 emphasize that Jesus fully entered into our human experience. What stands out to you about Jesus' empathy? How does this model shape the way we are called to empathize with others in difficult or divisive situations?
- 3. Have you ever found yourself afraid that showing empathy might mean compromising your convictions? How do you think we can hold both empathy and conviction faithfully?
- 4. Sometimes religious people rely on "rules" ("The Bible teaches...") to avoid engaging with people's real stories. Why do you think empathy is often resisted in the church? What barriers—personal, cultural, or theological—get in the way of practicing empathy?
- 5. Which fruit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control) do you think empathy most naturally leads to in your own life?
